YOUR PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS ARE AT RISK!

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) have proposed a rule that would expand federal regulatory authority over virtually all waters in the United States. If this rule is finalized, EPA will regulate practically all land that has water on it - even if the area is wet for a brief period of time.

This rule is currently in a public comment period. Farm Bureau urges ALL landowners to make a public comment telling EPA and the Corps to withdraw this rule. Join Farm Bureau in its "Ditch the Rule" campaign.

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

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INGREDIENTS

2 beef Ribeye Steaks Boneless, cut 1 inch thick (about 12 ounces each)

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 large russet potatoes, cut lengthwise into 8 wedges ea.

1 tablespoon minced green onions

Sour Cream and Onion Sauce (recipe follows) (optional) **Seasoning:**

2 tablespoons smoked or Spanish paprika

1-1/2 teaspoons sugar

1-1/2 teaspoons chili powder

1 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/2 teaspoon ground red pepper

Directions:

Combine seasoning ingredients in small bowl; remove and reserve 2

tablespoons. Press remaining seasoning evenly onto beef steaks; set aside. Combine reserved seasoning, oil and salt in large bowl. Add potatoes; toss to coat.

Place steaks on grid over medium, ash-covered coals; arrange potatoes around steaks. Grill steaks, covered, 10 to 14 minutes (over medium heat on preheated gas grill, 9 to 14 minutes) for medium rare (145°F) to medium (160°F) doneness, turning occasionally. Grill potatoes 14 to 17 minutes (over medium heat on preheated gas grill, 13 to 15 minutes) or until tender, turning occasionally.

Carve steaks into slices; season with salt, as desired. Sprinkle green onion over potatoes. Serve potatoes with Sour Cream and Onion Sauce for dipping, if desired.

Sour Cream and Onion Sauce: Combine 1/2 cup dairy sour cream and 2 tablespoons minced green onion. Sprinkle with smoked or Spanish paprika, as desired. Yield: 1/2 cup



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the producer has met all of the rules and requirements. Samples must be taken from a single cutting, with a hay probe, from a minimum of 5 randomly sampled square or round bales. Hay or baleage entries must have been harvested from fields with a minimum maturity or regrowth of 25 days. Forage samples with nitrate levels over 5000 parts per million (PPM) will be disqualified. Hay samples with more than 18% moisture will be disqualified, but there are no moisture requirements for baleage samples.

Southeastern Hay Contest

If you raise good quality hay, the Southeastern Hay Contest offers you the opportunity to document your quality, gain some recognition for your farm, and new this year, have your farm included in the Southeastern Hay Directory. Most hay farms are frustrated by the fact that they raise quality hay, but have to sell on a commodity market. The ultimate goal of the Southeastern Hay Contest is to recognize farms that produce top quality hay, and with the addition of the directory, give hay buyers a list of farms that test their hay for quality. Whether you are looking to broaden your customer base, or simply provide better information for your current customers, the Southeastern Hay Contest and Hay Directory have a lot to offer

The Southeast Hay Contest is currently accepting entries of hay and baleage entries from forage producers. Entries must be received by the lab no later than 5:00 PM on September 22, 2014. The \$17 per sample fee provides both entry in the contest, as well as a complete lab analysis that provides dry matter, crude protein (CP), total digestible nutrients (TDN), and a Relative Forage Quality (RFQ) score.

This year, your farm can also be listed in the new "Southeastern Hay Directory" of farms who participate in the Hay Contest. Hay buyers will now have a listing to use to purchase hay from farms with quality test results on their hay. For an additional \$30 annual fee, you can advertise your farm and the products you produce in this

web based directory. The SE Hay Directory will be maintained on the University of Georgia Feed Lab with links provided to it from the state forage websites (Alabama Forages, Georgia Forages, and Forages of Florida).

Each forage sample entry will compete in one of six categories, with the top entries being recognized in October, at the Sunbelt Agriculture Expo, in Moultrie, Georgia. Hay and baleage samples will be evaluated in the following categories:

- 1. Warm Season Perennial Grass Hay (bermudagrass, bahiagrass, etc.)
- 2. Perennial Peanut or Alfalfa Hay
- 3. Cool Season Perennial Grass Hay (tall fescue, orchardgrass, etc.)
- 4. Mixed, Annual Grass, or Other Hay (clover/fescue, clover/ryegrass, millet, ryegrass, etc)
- 5. Grass Baleage (high moisture grass forage ensiled in wrapped bales)
- 6. Legume Baleage (high moisture legume or grass/legume ensiled in wrapped bales)

For the first time this year, there will also be cash awards in addition to the recognition:

- Overall Highest RFQ Prize: \$150
- 1st Prize in Each Category: \$50
- 2nd Prize in Each Category: \$20 + 1 Free Forage Quality Test
- 3rd Prize in Each Category: 1 Free Forage Quality est

This contest is open to any forage producer in the southeastern U.S., but entries must be submitted by the farm where the forage was actually grown. Each entry form must be signed by your county agent, to verify that



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the fact that this is an export driven industry. Uruguay exports over 65% of their beef to the European Union, Turkey, Russia, and Israel. Uruguay achieved Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) free status with vaccination, and has been so since 2001. In order meet international traceability standards; Uruguay has implemented a national traceability system to keep up with each animal through its life all the way to the meat packing plant. The first traceability system was implemented in 1973 and became mandatory in 2006. The Uruguayan government provides electronic ear tags and producers are required by law to register all of their animals in the national database. Because of the grass-fed beef production systems, traceability, and their meat safety standards, Uruguay has found and export market to over 125 international markets, making it the sixth largest beef exporter in the world.

I encountered many things on this trip that reminded me of Georgia cattle production; one of the things was INIA, which serves farmers much like the UGA cooperative extension services, helping farmers when they have issues and by experimenting with different types of production techniques, and providing technical assistance to producers. The Uruguayan Hereford Breeders Association Bull Testing Station reminded me of the bull testing stations in Calhoun and Tifton. The Bulls were raised on grass for 200 days then after the testing was done the cattle were put on grain for three months before the bulls were sold at auction.

Contemplating on these similarities, I began thinking about agricultural production in Georgia and in the US. It is amazing to me that despite being a world away and speaking a different language, we were able to develop such close ties with our hosts in such a short period of time. I believe this is largely because of the passion we share for agriculture and the way of life that comes with primary production. Despite the fact that this was a foreign country, we met with producers who share the same challenges and ambitions that we have here at home. We saw producers who gleamed with pride when showing us their bulls, or their soybean crop, but that

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knew all too well, just like us, the challenges and struggles that come with pursuing dreams that are so heavily dependent on Mother Nature, and so many other variables. So I have returned from this trip excited about my ever nearing graduation date, I feel this trip has better prepared me for my hopeful career, and I am anxious to be a part of and contribute to this wonderful industry.

Conservation Corner

This has been a strange and frustrating year. Those of you who have worked with me know that I work diligently on working on projects and plans in a timely manner. This year has been the exception. With furloughs and budget wars and farm bill debates, many of the rules and guidelines and funding have trickled down to the field. We have plodded along working on the things that we could control such as developing the conservation plans and designing practices in these plans. We have also worked with those who do have contracts to get practices installed and to finish up. We are finally working on the 2014 applications with a smaller allocation than in the past.

In spite of this, there are some things that remain constant. Any practice that receives funding must meet NRCS standards and specifications and requires a field office checkout. All approved contracts must have a practice installed within the first 12 months. Check your conservation plan to see what is scheduled for this year. We send out reminder letters routinely. The ranking questions for the programs penalize those who are behind schedule if they apply again.

I am hopefully wrapping up 2014 and preparing for 2015 which for us, starts in October. We have high hopes that the next year will be more timely. Happy New Year!!

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Beef Production: A World Away

My name is Tyler Dungan I recently graduated in May from the University of Georgia College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences with a degree in Agribusiness. In March I was fortunate to travel to Uruguay to study and observe Uruguayan Beef Production and other forms of agricultural production.

Growing up in Forsyth, GA and showing cattle through Mary Persons FFA Chapter, I never thought that when I went to college I would one day travel to a foreign country to study agriculture. However the best decision I made while pursuing my bachelor's degree at UGA was to travel to Uruguay and participate in College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences Sustainable Livestock and Grain Production and Marketing Systems Program. While other students were packing their cars for a fun packed spring break vacation at the beach, I along with 18 other students from the College of Agricultural and Environmental Science (CAES) and our instructors, Dr. Curt Lacy (UGA's extension livestock economist), Dr. Nathan Smith (UGA extension crop economist), and Eric Rama (Graduate Student at UGA), boarded a plane for the small beef producing country of Uruguay.

When arriving in South America I had no clue what to expect, but our host Bruno Lanfranco, an economist for the National Institution for Agricultural Investigation (INIA) and an UGA alumnus, greeted us with open arms. He along with Mauricio Rodriguez, a veterinarian and cattle manager for several farmers, and Gabriel Oleggini, an UGA alumnus and administrator for CONAPROLE (the national dairy cooperative), guided us on a weeklong tour of different agricultural enterprises in Uruguay. That week we visited different operations that comprised the dairy, beef, grain, olive and lamb/wool supply chain. Many of these enterprises

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were highly diversified, integrating timber production and wind energy to their operations.

Uruguay is known for their beef cattle, so much so that the shape of the country is referred to as the "porterhouse shaped country". Uruguay is 68,000 square miles, making it slightly bigger than Georgia (59,000 square miles). Home to 3.3 million people and 11.1 million head of cattle, Uruguayan's are outnumbered 3.4 head of cattle to ever person in the country. A country rich in culture, Herford cattle make up about 80% of the national beef herd and serve as the image associated with the Uruguayan beef industry. The Angus breed comprises most of the difference, and is rapidly gaining popularity amongst cattle producers who seek the carcass traits that are associated with this breed. Seeing as how beef forms such an integral part of both the Uruguayan culture and economy, it is no surprise that Uruguayans consume the most beef per capita in the world, approximately 128 pounds of beef per capita, per year. This may seem like a lot and that's because it is! In the United States we consume approximately 65.8 pounds per year, a trend that has been declining since the mid 1970's. After a few in-country meals it was obvious that there was something different about Uruguayans eating habits, beef was present at virtually every meal and more often than not, beef was the main ingredient in our meals. Here in the United States, we tend to enjoy a larger selection of different meats, and accompany these with various sides.

Uruguay is a place with plentiful land to raise cattle, which is based on a grass-fed system due to high grain prices. Eighty-three percent of the country's surface area is used in raising cattle; of the land used for raising cattle 84% is in natural pastures while the other 16% of pastures are improved pastures. I would have never thought that a place based on grass-fed beef would call Bermuda grass a weed, however due to the absence of improved Bermuda grass varieties; it is more cost effective to utilize other perennial and annual forages for summer pasture.

Government regulation has issued laws that ban the use of animal anabolic and growth hormones; this is largely due to
